




Party Kit

9 Simple Steps

to Organize a Great Neighborhood Event!

1 Seek Neighborhood Partners

Find neighborhood groups and other organizations in your area who are interested in co-hosting a party and discuss ideas for content, funding and marketing.

2 Turn up Neighborhood Stories

Use your own networks to find stories about people who are making a difference in your community who can appear at the event to give a short (5-minute) presentation about what they've done. These can be little victories as well as earth-shattering accomplishments. (Flip through the Great Neighborhood Book for examples of the many ways people can make a difference, large and small). Hosting three or four people/groups describing to others what they did to improve their own neighborhood would make a very inspiring event.

3 Find a Neighborhood Venue

Find a venue that is well known and accessible to local residents. And then look for local restaurants or caterers for food and drink (they may be willing to become co-sponsors and donate the cost of the refreshments) vendors and even local musicians for entertainment

4 Get the Word Out

Finalize the date (giving yourself enough time to organize the event well) and start thinking about how people in the community are going to hear about the event. We have designed a poster that you can use to promote your event in shop windows, telephone poles, and community bulletin boards. Leaflets, email and announcing are all good ways to invite people and spread the word.

5 Encourage Everyone to Bring a Photo of What They Like and Don't Like

The power of a picture can be more illuminating than words. We encourage everyone who hosts a Great Neighborhood party to take pictures that help tell your neighborhood's story and encourage people (especially kids) coming to the party to bring their own pictures. You can create a "The Good, The Bad and The Ugly" display wall at the party to start a lively debate at the party about what works and what doesn't throughout the neighborhood.

6 Hold an Open House Ahead of the Event

On the day of the party, keep in mind that families or parents with young children may want to "drop by" earlier. Let people know there will be an open house in advance of the actual event. Using that time for people to bring their photographs and just see what's happening can be just as valuable for them as if they could attend the main event.

7 Gather People's Contact Information and Interests

Set up a prominent table at the event where people can leave important information (email/telephone/ chief interests) so you can get in touch with them after the party is over.

8 Make Sure Everyone Meets Their Neighbors

The most important goal of the event is for neighbors to meet one another and share their ideas about how to improve the neighborhood. Be sure to include this as part of the formal program. Immediately after the presentations, ask everyone to stay in their seats a minute and start a conversation with the person next to them about what is most needed in the neighborhood. Then ask for a few volunteers to summarize what they talked about. You will be surprised at the energy unleashed by this.

9 Keep It Going

Follow up on what people talked about most passionately at the event. If most folks wanted a community garden, create a committee to start one. If speeding traffic was a concern, get in touch with your party officials to set up a meeting on the issue. 
