The purpose of this letter is to confirm to you my interest in serving on the Board of Directors of the new Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone ("TIRZ").


I have been involved in the efforts to revitalize Downtown since the merger of the various downtown entities, back in the early 1990's, into the El Paso Downtown Management District and the El Paso Central Business Organization. In both cases, I was the lawyer that handled the mergers and formation work. Since then, I have continuously served as the secretary of those organizations.

I am a native El Pasoan who returned in 1971 to practice law. Since then, my practice centers around "business planning" matters, and I am Board Certified by the Texas Board Of Legal Specialization in: (i) Commercial Real Estate Law, and (ii) Estate Planning and Probate Law.

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

DAVID P. BUCHMUELLER
Consultant and Educator

David Buchmueller is a consultant and educator. In early 2006 he served as Interim CEO of Physicians Hospital in El Paso. Along with service volume increases, he helped to achieve improvements in charge capture, coding, billing and collection. When he started in February, 2006 the Hospital was billing about \$6 million per month in gross charges. Three recent months (August – October, 2006) have all exceeded \$10,000,000 in gross revenues. In addition, he led multiple efforts to reduce costs for supplies, equipment maintenance and other services with a net cost reduction of about 12%. He led successful effort to recruit permanent CEO.

For much of 2004 he served as (Interim) President/CEO of Kingston (NY) Regional Health System, overseeing a turnaround that increased cash to more than 20 times its lowest point and returned the principal hospital to profitability. He strengthened the management team and helped to restructure the Board, making both more efficient and effective. In 2002 – 2003 he served as Interim CEO of Southwestern General Hospital, El Paso, TX where he worked with doctors to increase census and secure added investment to assure the hospital's continued operation.

From 1996 to 1999 he was a senior executive with MMI Companies. In 1997 he served as President of an MMI subsidiary, doubling revenues while reducing expenses. In 1998 and 1999 he was Chief Operating Officer of MMI Management Consulting Group during which time his assignments included advising the CEO of a university hospital and conducting an assessment of a regional health system's management organization.

From 1991 to 1995, he was President/CEO of Providence Memorial Hospital in El Paso, Texas; initially as a member of the Hunter Group, he led a turnaround effort that transformed a 1991 loss into a \$12 million gain in 1992. The organization, which had been in technical default of its bond issue, remained financially successful and clinically strong until its sale in 1995. In late 1995 and early 1996 he served as consultant to and Interim CEO of Columbia/HCA owned Doctors Hospital in Laredo, TX.

In 1990-1991, Mr. Buchmueller, as a member of the Hunter Group, led a successful turnaround at New York Downtown Hospital (NYDH) in Manhattan, a New York University affiliated teaching hospital. This included significantly strengthening the hospital, physically and financially. While at NYDH he helped to achieve important changes in medical leadership while increasing revenue and decreasing costs. At both Providence and NYDH he led efforts to reconstitute the governing board to make it more reflective of its market and more effective in fund raising and other support activities.

From 1973 through 1990, Mr. Buchmueller served as CEO of two health systems, in Massachusetts and then in Pennsylvania. From 1967 to 1973 he was on the administrative staff of Rush Presbyterian St Luke's Medical Center in Chicago. In 1970, while at Rush, he was named one of Chicago's Ten Outstanding Young Men.

Mr. Buchmueller has a strong interest and significant experience in financial management, including planning, budgeting and daily operational controls. Except for his turnaround experience, hospitals of which he has been CEO have always operated in the black. He also has extensive experience in not for profit governance issues and management team building.

He has been a member and officer of the Boards of the El Paso Center for Children and Insights Science Museum. He is currently President of the FEMAP Foundation Board and Treasurer of El Paso Council for International Visitors Board. As a member of the MJD & Associates team, he has provided strategic planning and board development support for El Paso area not for profit organizations.

Mr. Buchmueller earned an MBA from the University of Chicago and a BA from Coe College in Iowa. He has been a Fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives and has served on numerous business and professional boards and committees. He currently holds an appointment as an adjunct professor in the University of Texas School of Public Health and has been a faculty member or preceptor for graduate students of Boston University, Johns Hopkins, Yale, University of Chicago, Duke, Loyola University (Chicago) and Ohio State University.

This program enables professionals to explore new interdisciplinary pathways, develop a broader knowledge and experience base, and challenge their own perspectives on pressing issues of national and international concern. Over the course of three years, the fellowship allowed me to travel world-wide to explore creative solutions to social problems used by other cultures, including Costa Rica, Thailand, Scotland, Mexico, Israel, Jordan, Egypt, Tanzania, Guatemala, Peru, South Africa, and United States.

This experience allowed me to learn from the field of leadership development through active and experiential learning designed to enhance skill-building capacity of leaders to engage in collaborative practices. I continue to share the knowledge I have gained as a Kellogg Fellow and to enrich my leadership capacity by networking with my colleagues, other leaders and activists from across the U.S. and around the world.

More than anything else, the fellowship deepened my belief that a society's future is dependent upon its investment in its children. As I traveled around talking with fellow teachers and school administrators about their practice, I meet many people who care about education and who have compelling vision for change. But after we talked for a while the conversation often took a discouraging turn. No matter how hopeful our dialogue had been, no matter how many of our colleagues embraced a new vision, no matter how many practical possibilities we explored, someone would inevitably say, "These are wonderful ideas, but every last one of them will be defeated by the conditions in my school."

What I learned from that experience is that leaders (people committed to positive change) must learn to deal with the challenge that is the unwillingness of people and communities to challenge themselves to question their own assumptions. There is an overwhelming tendency to accept the status quo. I learned that to challenge the status quo, leaders need the courage to take

calculated risks, while at the same time valuing traditions. To do this, we need to learn to stomach ambiguity. The life of the world is messy, a source of suffering as well as creativity, and if we want to work for change, we must learn to live with the mess.
